

## Modern Slavery Statement 2026

This statement is made on behalf of AVEVA Group Ltd and its subsidiaries (“AVEVA”) pursuant to section 54(1) of the Modern Slavery Act 2015 and section 6(2) of the Against Forced Labour and Child Labour in Supply Chains Act and section 5(1) of The Commonwealth Modern Slavery Act 2018 to disclose the actions taken to prevent modern slavery within our operations and supply chains for the financial year ending 31 December 2025.

AVEVA is a leading global provider of engineering and industrial software. On 18 January 2023, Schneider Electric completed the acquisition of AVEVA which is now wholly owned. However, Schneider Electric intends for AVEVA to remain autonomously governed. It consists of a parent company, AVEVA Group Ltd, incorporated in the U.K., with subsidiaries held directly or indirectly by AVEVA Group Ltd which are incorporated in various jurisdictions around the world (including Argentina, Australia, Brazil, Canada, Chile, China, Colombia, Czech Republic, Denmark, Egypt, Finland, France, Germany, Hong Kong, India, Indonesia, Ireland, Italy, Japan, Korea (the Republic of), Malaysia, Mexico, the Netherlands, Norway, Poland, Saudi Arabia, Singapore, South Africa, Spain, Sweden, Thailand, Turkey, the UAE, the U.K. and the U.S.), each contributing to AVEVA’s profits, assets and cash flows.

Our zero-tolerance stance against modern slavery is enshrined in our group-level Modern Slavery and Human Trafficking Policy (“the Policy”), which is reinforced by our *Business Conduct Guidelines*. This Policy applies comprehensively to all individuals associated with AVEVA, irrespective of their capacity, including employees, directors, contractors, and business partners. Breaches of this Policy are met with disciplinary actions, including potential dismissal, and could result in termination of our relationships with other parties.

In addition to our centralised procurement function, which primarily manages procurement related to supplier contracts, our subsidiaries and business units directly handle other procurement activities. Despite the varied nature of our business and supply chains, encompassing office supplies, IT and technology, transportation, recruitment, and legal and financial services, we assess the risk of modern slavery occurrence as relatively low as we do not produce tangible goods.

We require our business partners and suppliers to comply with applicable labour laws and international labour standards. This includes the right to a healthy and safe workplace, non-discrimination, freedom from forced labour and human trafficking, equal opportunity, freedom of association and privacy. We also require compliance with applicable laws on working hours, overtime, wages, and benefits.

AVEVA maintains a group-level *Supplier Code of Conduct* (“the Code”) which describes our ethical business practices. At a minimum, AVEVA requires suppliers to operate in full compliance with the laws, rules, and regulations of the jurisdictions in which they operate including any applicable international laws and regulations. The Code also encourages suppliers to go beyond legal compliance to advance business ethics drawing upon internationally recognised standards. Moreover, we continually strive to enhance our efforts in preventing modern slavery. In the previous financial year, we undertook several measures, including:

- Enhanced due diligence on all our suppliers and business partners to identify heightened modern slavery risks. This includes screening for offences related to modern slavery or human trafficking.
- Comprehensive staff training on modern slavery risks, integrated into our mandatory annual ethics training. Part of our procurement staff is taking part in the UN Global Compact Human Rights Accelerator, equipping themselves with the knowledge and tools to address modern slavery risks effectively.
- To further advance our efforts in promoting human rights and combating modern slavery across our supply chain, we have partnered with the UN Global Compact on the Sustainable Supplier Training Program to support a segment of our suppliers and partners in enhancing their ESG knowledge and practices.
- Inclusion of provisions in contracts with suppliers and contractors to ensure compliance with applicable laws, including the Modern Slavery Act 2015.
- Requiring existing and new suppliers to sign the Code or provide an equivalent code. Our Code specifies our zero-tolerance approach to modern slavery. AVEVA has deployed an ESG self-assessment questionnaire to 86% of suppliers representing the top 80% of the total spend (measured as invoiced amounts matched to Purchase Orders within the current year). This questionnaire helps evaluate suppliers' compliance with our Code, covering human rights, labour laws, policies and risk management practices. Based on the assessment results, we collaborate with suppliers to develop and implement Corrective Action Plans (CAPs) to drive continuous improvement and alignment with our standards.
- Furthermore, we align our practices with International Labour Organisation (ILO) indicators of modern slavery, emphasising compliance with labour laws and international labour standards. Our *Human Rights Policy* underscores our commitment to a healthy and safe workplace, non-discrimination, freedom from forced labour and human trafficking, equal opportunity, freedom of association, privacy, and compliance with laws governing working hours, wages, and benefits.

To assess the effectiveness of our measures, we issued 32 CAPs to suppliers and continue to work with them to strengthen relevant policies and statements where gaps are identified in 2025. In addition to that, we support our supplier's capability-building by inviting suppliers to the UN Global Compact (UNGC) Sustainable Suppliers Training Programme, which is based on the Ten Principles of the UNGC and is designed to help suppliers strengthen responsible business practices.

This Statement has been prepared by AVEVA's Ethics & Compliance team after consultation with various internal functions responsible for managing all the listed entities, which includes Procurement Responsible Sourcing, Sustainability and Company Secretary as the subject matter experts responsible for managing human rights and third-party labour rights risk management processes *across* our operations.

We are pleased to report that there have been no known instances of modern slavery within our business or supply chains, and we actively encourage reporting of potential concerns by our employees or any third-party through AVEVA's *Speak Up platform*. In the unfortunate event of identifying modern slavery in our workplace, we are committed to swift and effective remediation. We believe in transparency, accountability, and collaboration in addressing such

issues, working closely with relevant stakeholders to investigate, rectify, and prevent recurrence of modern slavery incidents.
