

MODERN SLAVERY STATEMENT 2025

INTRODUCTION FROM MOAZZAM MALIK, CEO OF SAVE THE CHILDREN UK

Modern slavery, including trafficking, forced labour, as well as forced recruitment for armed conflict, prostitution, pornography, and other illicit activities represents some of the worst children's rights violations in existence. Save the Children works with many children around the world who have experienced or are at risk from these forms of slavery. We help address the root causes of modern slavery, as well as support rehabilitation of those affected and protect them from further harm.

In line with the UN Guiding Principles for Business and Human Rights, we believe that all businesses have a responsibility to respect children's rights through their business activities. This starts with business identifying and responding to the risks that exist within their supply chains. In 2012 Save the Children supported the development of the Children's Rights and Business Principles with the UN Global Compact and UNICEF and we will continue to seek ways to promote responsible behaviour by the businesses with whom we work.

We are also committed to improving our own practices in this space by conducting all our business dealings with the highest standards of ethics and integrity. This statement sets out the steps that we have taken to eliminate, as far as possible, the risk of modern slavery and human trafficking taking place in our organisation and supply chains. This explains how we have addressed the issue during 2025 and how we plan to further mitigate the risks going forward.

THE MODERN SLAVERY ACT 2015

The Modern Slavery Act 2015 requires large UK organisations to publish annual statements to report on the steps they are taking to ensure that modern slavery and human trafficking are not taking place in their operations and in the supply chains that provide their goods and services.

Modern slavery is an overarching term used to describe a wide range of exploitation of labour, including slavery, forced or compulsory labour, servitude and other types of bonded labour, human trafficking and child labour.

SAVE THE CHILDREN UK'S STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Save the Children UK is a member of the Save the Children Association, a global movement made up of 29 separate national members and Save the Children International. We share one name and one ambition; a world in which every child has the right to survive, learn and be protected.

Members lead on activities principally within their home territory and work with donors to develop programmes abroad, which are delivered by a central body - Save the Children International - via teams on the ground in each country. Save the Children International also oversees humanitarian responses.

Save the Children UK is the Save the Children member for the UK. Our principal activities in the UK consist of fundraising and campaigning, advocacy on child rights and protection, and implementing programmes to address child poverty in the UK, as well as designing and monitoring our overseas programmes and providing support services necessary for the running of the organisation in the UK.

We own two trading subsidiaries: the Humanitarian Leadership Academy (Enterprises) Limited whose principal activity is the development of online humanitarian learning and accreditation platforms; and Save the Children (Sales) Limited, which is responsible for trading new goods in our charity shops (alongside donated goods), and from our website. All our shops are based in the UK. Save the Children UK also funds SCI to carry out programmes around the world and maintains oversight of the work we fund.

As of 31 December 2025, Save the Children UK had 748 active employees. As at the year ended 31 December 2025 Save the Children International itself had around 10,883 staff globally.

The Board of Trustees of Save the Children UK has overall responsibility for the governance of the charity. The Board delegates the day to day running of the charity to the Chief Executive Officer and to the Executive Directors but retains oversight of our operations through regular board and committee meetings.

OUR SUPPLY CHAINS

Save the Children UK has broadly two types of supply chain. The first is the supply chain for our UK operations, consisting of the supply of goods and services for use in our UK operations, and the supply of new goods for sale in our charity shops. The second concerns the supply chain in respect of our international operations, which are managed through our relationship with SCI. Each of these is dealt with below.

Procurement for UK operations

Save the Children directly procured £33.6 million of goods and services in the financial year end to 31 December 2025 to enable delivery of our operations and activities in the UK. This consisted mainly of costs related to our premises and services relating to fundraising and marketing, technology, professional services and travel, and it includes spend incurred by our wholly owned trading subsidiary HLA(E).

In addition to this, during 2025 we procured £373,000 of goods for sale by our other wholly owned trading subsidiary, Save the Children (Sales) Limited in our network of 81 charity shops, and from our online shop. These goods consisted predominantly of greetings cards, home fragrance, vintage clothing, plants and Christmas decorations. Our bespoke Save the Children New Goods range that is inspired by the children we work with is all sourced from either Fair Trade suppliers or manufactured in the UK.

The procurement of goods and services for our UK operations is overseen by our Procurement Team which is based in London. We have a procurement policy which requires different tendering, due diligence and approval levels depending on the value of the goods or services being procured, the nature of the supplier, and the relative risks involved.

Procurement for international operations

Under the Save the Children movement's global operating model, national members such as Save the Children UK do not generally operate outside their own countries, and instead passport funds to Save the Children International to manage and implement international programmes. Save the Children International is responsible for undertaking these programmes and for procuring goods and services for them. We work closely with Save the Children International and retain oversight over the use of our funds.

OUR POLICIES ON SLAVERY AND HUMAN TRAFFICKING

We are committed to ensuring that there is no modern slavery or human trafficking in any part of our business or our supply chains. Our framework of policies and procedures is regularly reviewed, which includes assessing and, where necessary, strengthening our existing policies to better address modern slavery issues.

In accordance with the Modern Slavery Act of 2015, it is essential that, as an organisation, we have measures in place to stop abuse of any nature. Our Human Trafficking and Modern Slavery Policy, reflects our commitment to acting ethically and with integrity in all our business relationships, and to implement and enforce effective systems, measures and controls to ensure slavery and human trafficking are not taking place anywhere in our operations or supply chains.

In addition to our Human Trafficking and Modern Slavery Policy, our wider policy framework addresses risks regarding modern slavery as follows:

- Procurement Policy – this is our primary policy for addressing modern slavery risks in our supply chain.
- Code of Conduct – this is our key staff ethical policy, and includes policy and guidance on ethical behaviour, management of conflicts of interest, and the reporting of issues.
- Safeguarding Policy – this is a key policy in setting out standards for our staff and partners regarding identifying and reporting the exploitation and abuse of children and vulnerable adults.
- Whistleblowing Policy – we have a whistleblowing hotline and whistleblowing policy.
- Anti-Fraud, Bribery and Corruption Policy – this complements our procurement and code of conduct policies and procedures to ensure compliance in these areas across our members of staff and is supplemented by regular training.
- Pay Policy – our staff pay policy ensures that staff we employ receive fair pay (you can read more about how we pay our staff on our website).

We are members or supporters of organisations and initiatives which address modern slavery issues:

- We are supporters of the International Labour Organization (ILO), which is a UN body which sets global standards for labour conditions.
- We are a signatory to the United Nations Global Compact. This encourages organisations to align their strategies and operations with universal principles on human rights, labour, the environment and anti-corruption, and take actions that advance

societal goals. Two of the ten principles of the UN Global Compact pertain to the elimination of all forms of forced and compulsory labour, and the effective abolition of child labour. Save the Children UK will continue to support the UN Global Compact in advancing all principles, including through our ongoing collaboration with the private sector.

- We are accredited by the Living Wage Foundation. This encourages organisations in the UK to ensure that all personnel working on their premises are paid the living wage.
- We are members of the Ethical Trading Initiative (ETI), an alliance of businesses, trade unions and NGOs working to reduce exploitation and ensure all workers enjoy conditions of freedom, security and equity. We are committed to meeting their base-code, which is an internationally recognised code of labour practice founded on ILO conventions.

OUR STAFF

We ensure that all the staff we employ receive at least the living wage, in line with our commitments under the Living Wage campaign. We also require that any agency workers that we engage in the UK are paid the living wage by the agencies that supply their services.

HOW WE HAVE IDENTIFIED AND ADDRESSED RISKS IN OUR SUPPLY CHAINS

As well as strengthening our policies to take account of modern slavery, we also identify the risks in our supply chains. We follow the UK Government's guidance on transparency in supply chains.

Mapping and risk assessing our supply chains

Save the Children UK has adopted a risk-based approach to addressing modern slavery. We understand areas where there may be a risk of modern slavery in our direct supply chains for our UK operations, and we assess the risk of modern slavery with new suppliers at the point at which we select and onboard them.

Since we manage indirect expenditure, most of our supply base relates to services where the provider operates from the UK and are the start and end of the supply chain.

In 2025 we did not procure any goods or services from what might be considered higher risk sectors, such as agriculture, food production or manufacturing, but we continue to focus on the supply chains for the new goods we sell in our charity shops, security, cleaning and other office services, as well as technology hardware which is sourced from locations overseas where the risk of modern slavery may be higher than in the UK.

Each year, all third-party suppliers with an annual spend of £100,000 or more are risk assessed for likelihood of slavery-related activities in their operations, and issues escalated where appropriate. In 2025, we assessed 49 suppliers. Only 2 of these suppliers operate in a relatively high Modern Slavery risk industry (cleaning and security). We work closely with the providers of facilities-related services and undertake contract reviews which include assurances that operatives are being paid, as a minimum, the Real Living Wage. In 2025 we engaged 3 face to face direct marketing agencies. Whilst this service is not a Modern Slavery high risk, there is a

risk of the fundraisers not being fairly remunerated, the risk of which we seek to mitigate via agency selection due diligence and contracting to ensure that fundraisers are paid, at least, the Real Living Wage.

There were no Modern Slavery issues to escalate in relation to any of our suppliers.

Our contracts and due diligence

Since we introduced an automated purchase-to-pay solution in 2020, all orders are routed via our procurement department before going for budget holder approval. This step provides an additional assurance that there were no new modern slavery risks in our supply chain.

Alongside enhancing our procurement and other policies, we include measures to address modern slavery in our standard supplier contracts. These include obligations on suppliers to adhere to International Labour Organization standards around child labour and forced labour, as well as provisions on the living wage, and child safeguarding standards. They also include specific references to UK modern slavery legislation, and a right of audit over our supply chains. We endeavour to negotiate these clauses into relevant supplier agreements, but acknowledge that this will not always be practical, for instance where we are procuring small quantities or dealing with large suppliers who operate on their own standard terms. Modern slavery is also included in our supplier due diligence questionnaires for prospective UK suppliers and, where appropriate, forms part of our supplier selection criteria. We also include modern slavery provisions in our standard fundraising contracts.

Engagement with suppliers

Our approach is to engage with suppliers in cases where we have identified a potential risk of modern slavery. This involves assessing assurances they provide and measures they might have in place to provide assurance on the risks of there being modern slavery in their supply chains. We endeavour to include a right to audit a supplier and its supply chain for modern slavery, we assess how and when we might reasonably need to undertake these audits.

Training and awareness

Everyone at Save the Children UK is required to complete mandatory modern slavery on-line training, which was designed to ensure that all staff can spot possible signs of modern-day slavery, understand our obligations within our roles, and feel confident in reporting offences. Currently 93% of staff have completed the training.

Our Procurement Team in London has undertaken modern slavery training delivered by the Ethical Trading Initiative and the Chartered Institute of Purchasing and Supply training on Ethical Procurement and Supply, which aims to prevent issues regarding human rights abuses, fraud, bribery and corruption and the impact of procurement on the environment.

Working with Save the Children International (SCI)

SCI has pledged to contribute to the elimination of child labour in all its forms. This objective is integrated in the way SCI works, across its goals to ensure safe access to school and learning, the strengthening of child protection systems, and promoting safety nets to build resilient

families. Ultimately, this work leads to strengthening the protection from child labour in contexts where SCI operate.

Beyond this, together with other child rights organisations, Save the Children continued to advocate for embedding children's rights in corporate sustainability reporting and due diligence rules, and welcomed the inclusion of references to the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child in the EU Corporate Sustainability Due Diligence Directive that came into force in 2024.

SCI has incorporated work on protecting children from child labour in global supply chains, by implementing measures and mechanisms that provide a rights-based approach to tackle child labour in its partnerships with actors in the corporate sector.

We work with our colleagues at SCI to ensure that there are suitable policies and procedures in place regarding the procurement of goods and services that SCI undertake to deliver Save the Children UK funded programmatic activity.

SCI requirements to mitigate the risk of human trafficking and modern slavery are embedded into its supplier contracts, risk assessments and due diligence procedures regarding modern slavery. SCI has a Supplier Sustainability Policy and supports suppliers in developing their sustainability business practices. SCI utilises a global source to pay platform which provides controls around supplier selection and vetting and gives visibility over SCI's suppliers, procurement and payment processes and enables increased compliance with systemised controls. INCIDENTS IN 2025

We had no reports of modern slavery or human trafficking in our supply chains in 2025.

ONLINE REGISTRY

Save the Children UK has added its annual modern slavery statement to the UK government's modern slavery statement online registry.

FURTHER STEPS

We are committed to continuing to combat modern slavery, and to build on the steps already taken regarding the supply chains for our UK and international operations. The issue of international supply chains is especially complicated, and we work alongside our colleagues at SCI to improve awareness and understanding of modern slavery issues. This includes enhancing training of staff members and (in some contexts where it is considered necessary) suppliers, due diligence on suppliers, and the procedures for identifying and reporting modern slavery incidents and concerns.

This statement is made pursuant to section 54(1) of the Modern Slavery Act 2015 and constitutes our slavery and human trafficking statement for the financial year ending 31 December 2025.
